State of Kentucky, No. 1000, Circuit, S. S.

On this 11th day of August 1820 personally appeared  
in open court being a court of record for the Circuit  
of Boone Co. made & constituted by act of the Legisla-  
ture of the State of making a de. cor. of its proceed-  
ings with a jurisdiction unlimited in point of  
amount, George Worn, aged 62 years near October  
(who being first duly sworn according to law, doth  
on his oath make the following statement in  
order to obtain the provisions made by act of  
Congress of the 18th of March 1818 & the 1st of  
May 1820. That he the said G. Worn enlisted for  
the term of three years on the 17th day of January  
in the year 1777 in the State of Pennsylvania  
in the Company of said I wear in the  
Regiment commanded by Col. Broadhead  
& Col. Bayard in the line of the State of Penn-  
sylvania in the regular Continental Establish-  
ment that he continued to serve in said Corps  
until the term of his enlistment expired, when  
he was discharged from the said service in the  
State of Pennsylvania at Pittsburgh, that  
he was engaged in the Allegany  
River that he was in another in the Tobacco  
that he was honourably discharged by Lt. Gordon  
that his discharge is lost or mislaid so that  
the same is not in his possession that he has no  
other evidence now in his power of his said  
service except that Eli Davis was his superior  
at the same time and knows of my services as  
part of the time as stated & sworn to by him  
in my former application - And in pursu-  
ance of the act of the 1st May 1820 I do  
solemnly swear that I was a resident citi-  
zen of the United States on the 1st day of  
March 1818 and that I have not since.

that time by gift, sale, or in any manner  
disposed my property or any part thereof with  
intent thereby to diminish it or to bring  
myself within the provisions of an act of  
Congress in title 21 and act to provide for cer-  
tain persons engaged in the land. I was at  
service of the United States in the Revolution-  
ary war, passed on the 18th day of March  
1812 and that I have not now nor had any  
person in trust for me any property or  
counter contracts or debts due to me nor  
have I any in my other than what is con-  
tained in the schedule here to annexed and by  
me subscribed

A schedule of the property of George Corn  
I have no property of any description - I am a  
farmer by occupation, but am aged and crippled  
in firm and am crippled in the hand of my hand but  
do but little at it I have four <sup>children</sup> myself  
my wife aged 57 years a daughter named Sally  
aged 14 years the next a boy named John Jefferson  
aged 11 years next a wife the next a daughter  
named Malinda aged 9 years - That his family  
live with his son in law and they are incompetent to  
contribute much to their support

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War record of George Corn who served as private and lieutenant in Captain Van Swearingen's company of the 8<sup>th</sup> Pennsylvania regiment, also that of George Corn who died in Jackson County, Ohio.

The data which follow were obtained from papers on file in pension claim, S.2143, based upon service of George Corn in the Revolutionary War, and is the only pension claim found based upon service in the Revolutionary War of a soldier by that name.

George Corn was born in October, 1758, place of his birth and names of his parents are not shown.

While living on the Monongahela River near Red Stone Fort in Pennsylvania, George Corn enlisted January 17, 1777, served as private and lieutenant in Captain Van Swearingin's company, Colonel Brodhead's and Bayard's 8<sup>th</sup> Pennsylvania Regiment and at the end of three years service was discharged. He then went to Kentucky and enlisted in June 1780, and served under Colonels Ben Logan, John Campbell, George Gibson, W. Lynn and H. McCoy in the Virginia troops, length of service not stated. During his services he was in a battle on the Allegany River, and on the Tuscarawas River, the battles of Pickaway, Floyd's Defeat, Estill's, Blue Licks where he was severely wounded in the jaw, and in other Indian battles.

George Corn was living in Boone County, Kentucky, in 1818. In 1820, he was living in Boone County, Kentucky with his son-in-law, (his name and that of his wife not given) at which time he referred

to his wife aged fifty-one years, and to a daughter, Sally, a boy, Tom Jefferson, and a daughter, Blinda, aged fourteen, eleven and nine years respectively. The name of his wife is not stated, and no further family data are shown.

George Corn was allowed pension on his application executed August 9, 1832, at which time he was a resident of Boone County, Kentucky.

In order to obtain the date of last payment of pension, the name and address of person paid and possibly the date of death of George Corn, you should address the Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, Records Division, this city, and cite the following data:
